Library elves

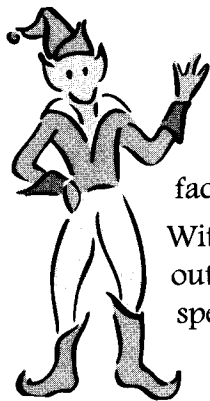
We are the menders, the library

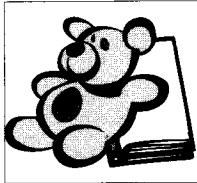
June 4: *Maestro: Green-span's Fed and the American Boom/Woodward.*

All are welcome to attend; reservations are not required. Copies of each selection will be available at the library's Information Desk six weeks prior to the discussion.



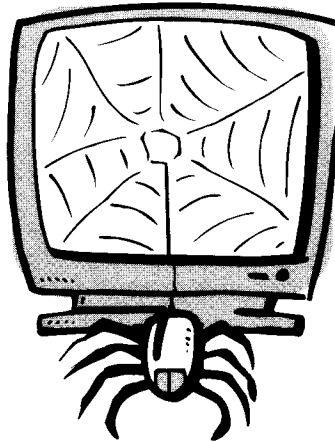
Children's Corner



New online catalog will offer more options for kids

The Fairport Public Library Children's Room will soon have a new online catalog available. KidsCat will be replaced by KCWeb, an Internet-based catalog for use in the library, as well as from home.

KCWeb has all the basic features of KidsCat (Find It!, Explore, Type Search, Best Stories, etc.) along with two new very useful features. First, there is a spell checker to help the search process find exactly what you're looking for. Second, links to pre-selected Internet sites will appear with a list of books and non-print materials when the catalog is searched by subject. This is




the first time that access to Internet resources will be offered at the public terminals in the Children's Room.

Trained Children's Librarians have examined and selected appropriate web sites for KCWeb in much the same way our local librarians examine and select books and other materials for the Library's collections. The web sites are selected based on their content, ease of use, age

appropriateness, accuracy, currency and reliability.

KCWeb will bring select-ed Internet access to the Children's Room. Children using KCWeb will not be able to type in any Internet addresses, as the address bar will not display. It guides access by providing links to only preselected sites.

Although no method of limiting the Internet is completely foolproof, KCWeb can provide a designed environment for children to use the Internet as an information resource. The KCWeb workstations will be limited to catalog searches, with no games or e-mail allowed. Library staff will monitor the workstations as closely as possible, but it remains the primary responsibility of parents to supervise their children's use of the catalog and Internet in the Library.
