Over Memorial Day weekend, library staff member, Joseph Monachino, Sr. presented the library with a beautiful new custom-made reference desk.

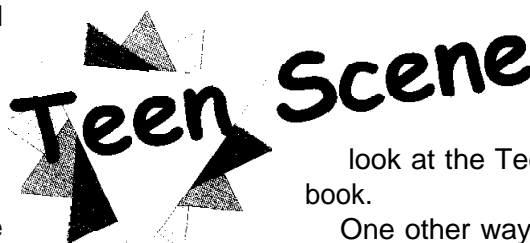

What's NEW in the Teen Area?

To make it easier for you to find new titles, we now have NEW Fiction and NEW Non-Fiction sections where you will find our newest titles. The fiction titles have been in the collection for six months or less. The non-fiction titles are for personal interest reading as opposed to books needed for assignments. Check these areas first for some new reading!

Finding a book to read can sometimes be overwhelming. Besides our NEW sections, there are some other ways to find great books to read. One way is to check the spine labels. We label many genres to make finding your favorite types of books easier. We have Fantasy, Science Fiction, Historical Fiction Humor, Mystery, Horror, and Romance labels to help identify those reading interests. If you like to read books that are part of a series we have labels on those as well. If short stories appeal to you, look for the short story label. We also have many booklists available which

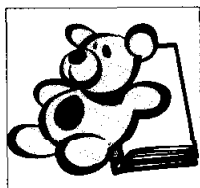


have been developed by Teen Services Librarians throughout the country. If that is not enough, you may

look at the Teen Reading Suggestions book.

One other way to choose a book is to subscribe to the free Online Book Club available through the Monroe County Library System. With just an e-mail address, you can subscribe to receive a new chapter each day for a week. Each week there is a new book. You may read the chapters and if you are enjoying the book, you may use the link to the Library Catalog to find out which library owns the book. If you don't like the book, just delete the chapters as they arrive and wait for a new book to begin. This is a fun way to get to know some new books!

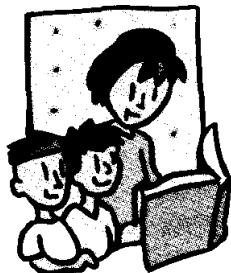
