Library computers will phase out floppy drives

Have you ever spent a long time working on a document and saved it to a 3½-inch floppy disk, only to discover the next time you wanted to open the file, it was corrupted, destroyed or gone? Floppy disks can easily be damaged and can also damage the drive on the computer, ruining access for all floppies.

New technology saves the day! A flash drive (pen drive, USB drive) is a very small, portable hard drive that connects to the computer through

the USB ports. These drives can store between 64 mb and 1024 mb (actually 1 gb) of data, and you can easily carry it on your keychain or in your pocket. The cost for these drives is fairly reasonable, starting about \$15 for the smaller units. Best of all, there are no moving parts to be damaged!

Right now, library computers have both floppy drives and USB ports for flash drives. Some of you may have already

The bags can be borrowed for three weeks. Return your bag when you return your other library materials and check out another one to take home new items. 📖

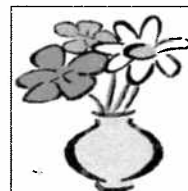
Adult Summer Reading Treasure

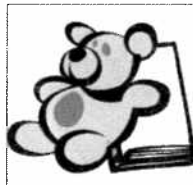
Gift books can honor loved ones
